A history of philanthropy


The University of Westminster would not exist today if it weren't for philanthropy. Our story began in 1838, when Sir George Cayley opened the Polytechnic Institution at 309 Regent Street in London, a building that is at the very heart of our University today.

In 1881, philanthropist Quintin Hogg bought the Royal Polytechnic Institution building and moved his Young Men's Christian Institute into 309 Regent Street, which soon became the publicly funded Regent Street Polytechnic.

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BECAUSE WE CARE



Leaving the security of the family home or the familiarity of school can be a daunting time for any student. The financial commitments of a university education are also well documented, but for those who have been through local authority care or have become estranged from their families, the financial and emotional pressures are often greater. Currently, just 6% of students who have left the care system go on to higher education.

The University of Westminster has long held a commitment to widening access to those from under-represented groups. We are working with a number of partners to provide bespoke support for care leavers or estranged students, including alleviating financial and personal barriers which may prevent their journey into or through higher education, and providing ongoing pastoral care through their studies.

So many talented potential students miss out on a University education, simply because they do not have the funds to support the costs associated with tuition and living. For international students, or for those balancing family or work commitments alongside their studies, the pressures can be even greater.

In the spirit of the University's long history of providing education for all, we offer

a range of scholarships to support students from a variety of backgrounds and circumstances: from full fee waivers through to maintenance scholarships which are open to all students, regardless of their nationality or whether they are studying for an undergraduate or postgraduate degree. The University of Westminster is also one of the few universities in the UK to offer full scholarships to postgraduate students.

Doing a PhD demands extraordinary commitment - emotional, psychological, intellectual, time and financial. Due to such scant external sources of funding available many researchers struggle to find the funding they need to enrich their research, deepen their understanding and ultimately reach their true potential.

The additional costs incurred to complete their research can often

be overwhelming, stretching them too far financially and having a detrimental impact on their focus and wellbeing. The University is committed to developing a unified, interdisciplinary community of researchers with a vibrant body of PhD students at its heart.

We typically have in the region of 450 doctoral researchers who are contributing their expertise across subject boundaries and, through innovative ways of working, are

ensuring that their knowledge, expertise, passion and energy contributes to global debates and new solutions. In memory of the late Professor Geoffrey Petts, former Vice-Chancellor and President of the University, we've established this fund to recognise the distinguished contributions Geoffrey made to interdisciplinary river science research and his belief that all students, regardless of their financial situation, should have the opportunity to succeed.

This is why we have created The 125 Fund in collaboration with the Quintin Hogg Trust, in order to award grants to students wishing to develop their own enterprises, or their professional development through other endeavours. From funding costs associated with establishing a start-up, through to supporting extra-curricular conferences and courses, The 125 Fund awards grants to unique projects led by our students.

London is one of the world's most loved and connected cities. It can also be a very lonely place, especially for vulnerable groups who may not have the social capital or connections to enjoy all the city has to offer. Across the UK, the loneliness epidemic is gathering speed and severity and a number of government-led initiatives have been established to combat the issue.

The University of Westminster's Regent Street Cinema, situated in the heart of central London, delivers a range of community engagement initiatives to encourage social interaction and help our local residents come together. The Matinee Classics programme is one example of this. Created especially for the over 55s, local residents are invited to enjoy a classic film at the cinema every Wednesday, followed by a tea dance and refreshments. Tickets are subsidised by our donors, enabling as many guests as possible to take part in the experience, which they frequently describe as 'a life saver', 'the best medicine' and a regular outing that 'makes the world of difference'. Meanwhile on Saturday mornings, the Kids Kino Club provides discounted tickets for parents and children who often require additional support.

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A LIFELINE DURING A CRISIS



Studying at University places a financial strain on most students but for some this burden can be even greater. The reality of coping with this might mean working long unsociable hours in part time jobs, reducing – or even totally prohibiting – their ability to wholeheartedly commit to their University experience.

The hardship fund provides vital assistance to students who, through no fault of their own, need some extra financial help to ensure they continue with their studies and reach their full potential. Even with the best financial planning, many students experience unexpected hardship. Unforeseen circumstances, additional costs or a change in personal situation can often leave students unable to cover essential costs such as day-to-day living expenses, rent, travel and childcare.

In an emergency situation, students can apply for grants of up to £1,200 from the hardship fund which can make all the difference to a promising student by enabling them to stay at University, focus on their studies and successfully graduate.

How you can help

Your support will help students experiencing hardship to reduce their working hours and ease any financial worries they have so that they can commit themselves fully to their studies and reach their full potential. A donation of:



£9,000 will cover a student's accommodation for a year, £750 for a month



£6,000 will cover a student's essential living expenses for a year, £500 for a month

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


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CREATING GLOBAL OPPORTUNITIES

We are fortunate to live in a time when overseas travel has become a relatively accessible and normal part of everyday life. More than ever, students need to prove that they are globally engaged to give them a distinctive edge in today's competitive job market. For many students however, being able to take advantage of learning opportunities abroad is an increasingly difficult prospect alongside affording other costs associated with their University education.

This is why we have established our Westminster Working Cultures programme, which gives undergraduate students the opportunity to travel to some of the world's most extraordinary cities – including Hong Kong, Washington DC and Mumbai – to gain invaluable insight into the employment landscape and culture. Students learn through a variety of work place tours and seminars in the region, provided by our alumni and partners. Students must apply to take part in this popular programme, and priority is given to students from lower socio-economic backgrounds who would not otherwise have had the means, or the confidence, to travel abroad for short-term work insight opportunities. The costs of flights and accommodation are fully funded by our generous donors, removing all obstacles for students to apply.
